### 60 km fencing to protect Hessen against African Swine Fever

The authorities in Hessen have begun the erection of a 60 km fence along the North Rhine-Westphalia border to prevent the further spread of African Swine Fever. The fencing is intended as a long-term solution and is expected to be completed by the end of the year.

ASF was confirmed in North Rhine-Westphalia in June and since then, 175 infected wild boar have been reported in the area. An electric fence has already been established and intensive testing introduced. The electric fence will serve as an additional barrier to prevent wild boar from crossing the border.



#### South Korea reopens its border to German pigmeat

The South Korean Ministry of Agriculture has lifted import restrictions with effect from 23 October. The restrictions were introduced as a result of an outbreak of foot & mouth disease in January.

The reopening is conditional upon the applicable requirements concerning African Swine Fever continue to be met. To meet this requirement, the German authorities have drawn up an updated veterinary certificate.

South Korea is a key export market for Germany. In 2024, the country was the third largest market outside the EU measured in tonnage and the second largest measured in value. Bellies are in particular demand by South Korean consumers.

The current ASF regionalisation agreement was established in May 2023.



#### Closure of slaughter plant causes concern among pig producers

The German producers' organisation, ISN, has expressed concern that the closure of a slaughtering plant may mean a build-up of finishers in eastern Germany.

The previously Vion-owned slaughtering plant, Perleberg in eastern Germany, has been closed since October. The plant slaughtered around 20,000 pigs per week. It was expected that these pigs would be slaughtered by Töennies plant in Weisenfels, which would expand its capacity.

However, such an expansion of the Weisenfels plant is in doubt and ISN has warned of a shortage of slaughtering capacity in eastern Germany over the coming months.



#### Malaysia to open its market to pigmeat from Brazil

According to Pig 333, which cites the Brazilian Agriculture Minister Carlos Favaro, Brazil is working to open the Malaysian market to its pigmeat exports.

In connection with a visit by President Lula to Malaysia and meetings between the two countries' agriculture ministers, it has been decided that the authorities in Malaysia will undertake inspection visits to 16 Brazilian pigmeat companies with a view to the export of Brazilian pigmeat to Malaysia.



#### Pig producers praise Trump for creating greater market access to Malaysia

On behalf of American pig producers, the President of the National Pork Producers Council (NPPC), Duane Stateler, has expressed his gratitude for the fact that President Trump has apparently succeeded in securing greater market access for American pigmeat to Malaysia.

In connection with his visit to South East Asia, President Trump has signed trading agreements with Malaysia and Cambodia: agreements that, according to NPPC, could mean a boost to exports of American pigmeat to the two countries.

According to NPPC, the trading agreements mean that going forward, exports of pigmeat to the two countries will be allowed from all U.S. facilities inspected by U.S. authorities. So far only eight U.S. plants

have been granted access to Malaysia. In 2024, the U.S. exported USD 24.5 million worth of pigmeat to Malaysia.



#### Rabobank: Uncertain outlook and focus on productivity

Rabobank's quarterly report from October states that the global sow herd is expected to decline in 2026. The reason is increased uncertainty for producers.

Although lower feed costs and a tighter supplies of meat will improve profitability, pig producers will be reluctant to expand their herd. Instead the industry will be focusing on improving productivity, optimising carcase weights and improving herd health, says Rabobank.

The global sow population is expected to decline by 1 per cent, largely as a result of China's decision to reduce its population by 1 million sows. Some of this decline, however, will be offset by continued growth in Brazil, where favourable margins and strong exports are driving development.

Trade in pigmeat until June this year increased by 3 per cent compared with the same period last year. This indicates that global trade in 2025 will be on a par with previous levels. Brazil stands out as being in a position to expand its market share from 12 per cent to 15 per cent, which is due to a targetted effort to expand market access and diversify exports.

Geopolitical tensions continue to present challenges for both the U.S. and the EU, particularly in relation to exports to China. These tensions are expected to contribute to trade instability.

Disease continues to pose a risk for pig producers globally. However, there are signs of a greater stability in production and trade in 2026 following several years of health challenges. African Swine Fever (ASF) remains a problem, particularly in Vietnam and parts of Europe. In addition, PRRS is creating significant losses in North America and Europe. Foot & Mouth disease is also a challenge.

Rabobank's assessment is the pigmeat prices will remain strong as demand growth outpaces supply in most markets. In the EU and North America, falling inventories have led to price increases, while China has seen the opposite. Pigmeat consumption is expected to remain stable, but inflation could put pressure on sales at the end of 2025 and at the start of 2026. The limited supplies of beef and chicken could, however, support pigmeat consumption, although certain cuts may face downward pressure.



#### Costa Food Group invests in processing factory in Paraguay

Paraguay's Trade & Industry Ministry has confirmed that the Spanish meat producer, Costa Food Group, is planning to invest in a new processing factory in Paraguay. The investment is part of the company's strategy to reinforce its presence in Latin America.

The precise amount of the investment has not been disclosed.



#### NH Foods and CPF enter into strategic cooperation

The Japanese and Thai food giants, NH Foods and CPF (Charoen Pokphand Foods) has announced a joint venture focusing on the development, production and marketing of processed pigmeat products.

The products will be targetted at consumers in Thailand and other key markets in Asia, including Japan, Hong Kong and Singapore.

NH Foods will bring global expertise in the form of product development and advanced production technologies to the table, while CPF will be responsible for raw material supply and draw on its extensive distribution network in Thailand and the rest of the region.
