**POLAND:** One new case was reported last week among wild boar in the east of the country, close to the border with Belarus.

## EU Commission supports new Polish initiatives for controlling ASF

Agra Europe reports that the EU's Agriculture Commissioner Phil Hogan has indicated that Poland will be granted permission to help the country's pig producers deal with ASF more effectively.

Following an EU Council meeting last week, Hogan told journalists:"I welcome the fact that Poland has brought forward proposals in the past few days with concrete actions that can be taken which will have the support of the Commission in helping to stop the spread of this particular disease which would have a serious impact on the pig meat sector"

Poland has informed the Commission that more effective control of ASF requires more robust regulations and better compensation for Polish pig producers in affected areas. They are looking for EU funding and for veterinary resources.

**LITHUANIA:** Three new cases were reported last week among wild boar in the east of the country.

**RUSSIA:** Three new cases were reported last week: two at small pig farms and one at a large farm comprising 38,037 pigs All cases are in the west of the country.

**UKRAINE:** Six new cases were reported last week: five at small farms and one at a large farm of 2,000 pigs. The cases were spread across the country.



## Russia finds traces of ASF in smuggled Ukrainian meat

Russia claims to have found traces of ASF in smuggled meat from Ukraine.

Rosselkhoznadzor, the Russian veterinary authorities, says that the discovery shows that all areas bordering Ukraine are at risk because of the lack of control. It also claims that tests confirm that Ukrainian pig meat products were shipped across the border to Kursk oblast in Russia without the necessary veterinary documents. Furthermore, Ukraine is accused of not doing enough to stop the infected pigs and pig meat from being transported to slaughterhouses and factories.



## Pig meat exports

The EU Commission has published preliminary figures for EU pig meat exports (measured in slaughter weight) for the period January-August 2016 compared to January-August 2015.

## Forecast production, consumption and trade in pig meat in 2017

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has published its forecast for the production, consumption and trade in pig meat in 2017 for a number of countries.

Trading only covers fresh/frozen pig meat. Chinese imports of by-products are thus not included in the import/export figures.

## **Damage after Hurricane Matthew**

Hurricane Matthew hit North Carolina last Saturday and caused widespread damage. According to U.S. news media, which quotes the Governor of North Carolina, flooding has resulted in the drowning of at least 1.8 million chickens and 4,800 pigs.

A number of slurry lagoons were flooded, which has meant that diluted slurry has spread to surrounding areas. However, no extensive environmental damage has been reported.

The major pig slaughterhouses in the state have resumed operations and expect to run at full capacity from this week. This includes Smithfield's Tar Heel plant, which slaughters 32,500 pigs per day. According to a spokesman from the company, none of the company's plants has been seriously damaged, but flooding has impeded pig supplies and prevented employees getting to work.



#### WH Group receives its first rating

Last week, WH Group Limited announced that the company has been rated by the three international credit agencies, Fitch, Moody's and S&P Global Ratings for the first time.

## China confiscates 200,000 smuggled pigs from Vietnam

Asian Agribusiness reports that the Chinese authorities in south China's Guangxi region seized a total of 262,000 live pigs smuggled from neighbouring Vietnam in the first eight months of this year.

The pigs, valued at \$65 million, were confiscated in eight different cases. The Chinese authorities say that they will tighten border controls to discourage the smuggling of live pigs from Vietnam.

China's live pig prices hit a record high in the first half of 2016, triggering a hike in pig meat imports as well as smuggling.

#### Massive over capacity at slaughterhouses

AHDB Pork, whose source is Asian Pork, reports that the Chinese meat processing sector is oversized for production. For example, the Yurun abattoir is only running at 30% of its 50m head capacity.



#### Atria gains access to Chinese market

Agra Europe reports that the Finnish meat group, Atria, has been granted permission to export pig meat to China – the first Finnish company to do so.



## Canada opens its doors to Mexican pig meat

The Pig Site reports that Canada has opened up its market to pig meat from Mexico. This follows in the wake of Canada certifying Mexico as free from Classical Swine Fever.



#### Carmarthen ham achieves PGI status

Another pig meat product – Carmarthen ham - has obtained EU Protected Geographical Indication (PGI) status, which means that the product must be produced or processed in a particular geographical area in the EU. Carmarthen ham is dry salt cured then air-dried, weighs between 4-5 kg, and takes 6-9 months to mature. The hams are marketed as whole hams or boneless, cut and packed in slices of various shapes and sizes in line with customer requirements.

A number of UK food manufacturers have recently highlighted their concerns about the future of PGI products, when Britain leaves the EU. The issue was brought forward by the Labour Party last week as one of its 170 Brexit-related questions. The party has challenged the government to explain how it will protect the 77 products in the UK, which currently enjoy PGI status.



## Vion on the lookout for capital

Vion and its owner, the ZLTO co-operative, are looking for €200 million to enlarge capacity, modernise production and adapt export demand, particularly from China.

As ZLTO does not have the capital, various options are being considered, including the full or partial sale of Vion.

Moreover, it is reported that the Vion Global Pork Scheme aims to supply Japanese and German supermarkets with pig meat from pigs from 180 farms raised within Vion's welfare standard.

## Sale of antibiotic-free pig meat

AHDB Pork reports that Keten Duurzam Varkensvlees (the sustainable pork chain) is developing an antibiotics-free pig meat offer. Some 120 pig farmers are involved.

As previously reported in Market News (week 29), KDV represents 300 Dutch producers and collaborates with the Dutch meat processor, Westfort.
